

Discussion Questions

- 2) Both characters in the story make choices that go against their natural instincts. What were these choices, and how did their choices mark them?
- 3) Have you ever been a trickster, and if so, in what way, if any, did the experience mark you or the person you tricked?
- 4) When should we trust?
- 5) When should we help others and when should we let natural selection take its course?
- 6) What differentiates good and bad tricks?
- 7) The possum is lazy during the daytime because it is nocturnal. If the deer had encountered the possum at night, would the story have a different ending?
- 8) What good came out of the story?
